A scamming business may install solar panels that are entirely different to the ones they've shown you on their marketing and sales materials, so always be clear on what you're being sold. Solar Scam 2: High-pressure sales tactics. As with any high-value purchase, you should take your time to decide if having solar panels is something you want.

Cold call 1: "Free health check for your solar panels" This was by far the most common cold call solar panel owners said they received, with 44 per cent having been approached about this.

Did a salesperson knock on your door and promise free rooftop solar panels at no cost to you? Or say you'll never have to pay another electricity bill because government programs, grants, or rebates cover your solar installation? It's likely a scam. While there are some government-funded solar programs for households that qualify, "going solar" isn't free. Honest ...

A solar power scam is when salesperson(s) or ads on the internet trying to sell high-efficiency solar panels at a low price with other benefits and a high rate of return. They claim to have special government rebate quotas and provide free solar modules under approved government schemes. They are either selling very poor-quality products or ...
